Dear Time Travellers,

My name Diana, I'm Head of Education here at the Minster. The staff, volunteers and I have been working hard planning your visit -Time Travelling is one of our favourite weeks of the year. I'm excited to meet you, please come and say 'hello' if you see me.



People often ask 'why is it called Time Travelling?' There are lots of reasons. Let's think first about

TIME. The Minster is medieval; the oldest part is over 900 years old. To build it, a smaller **Anglo-Saxon** church was knocked down. Before that, we think **Roman** Gods were worshipped in a temple or shrine nearby. You will follow in their footsteps - your feet will tread the same path as those who were here 1800 years ago.... **We are all connected in TIME by the Minster's long history.**



Next, **TRAVELLING.** A pilgrimage is a journey to a place which means something to you. The Minster is important to all of us in Nottinghamshire because it's our **Cathedral** – it contains evidence of our local and national history. You will TRAVEL here by bus (most of you), where you'll be met by your pilgrim guide, who will make sure you don't get lost as you travel around the Minster on foot. Some people say that life is a pilgrimage. Christians believe God is with them as they travel from birth to death – the destination is heaven. I hope that helps.

I'd like you to remember **TLC**: **Travel Learn** and **Connect.** Pilgrims **T**ravel to a

special place; Learn about themselves and others; and Connect – to a place, new friends and those in the past. On your pilgrimage, you'll do 5 activities. You will find out how Christians worship and why we believe in helping others; you'll hear Bible stories and learn about the building and the people who work here. You will meet new people and sing songs when we get together at the start and end of the day. Do your best to learn and make connections, joining in as much as you can.

When pilgrims leave, they usually take a souvenir home. You will make something to keep, and we will give you a 'journal' as a reminder of your pilgrimage. The Minster is a big, beautiful, building with lots of amazing things to see – from enormous arches to tiny carved mice...like this one.




These mice are Victorian, carved into some of our furniture
