The Service of Evensong

The experience of the service of Evensong is unique. It takes place at the end of the working day, and the choir leads worship through their singing. The service is centred around the singing of psalms, ancient texts that speak powerfully and accessibly to our very human hopes, fears and dreams. Every service of Evensong also includes two canticles, or songs, recorded in St Luke's Gospel: the *Magnificat* and *Nunc dimittis*. Both canticles focus on hope and the fulfilment of what God promised to his people, and so have acted as a foundation for prayer and reflection towards the end of the day for many hundreds of years. The beauty of daily sung services in cathedrals is that no two composers' interpretation of these texts is the same, so in the repetition of familiar texts we find fresh meaning every single day.

The gift of the service of Evensong is that it requires little active participation from the congregation; it is a service of respite from the stresses of the day. Our hope is that those of you for whom this is your first taste of Evensong will let yourselves be immersed in the experience: you need simply to be receptive, and to allow yourself to be carried by the choir in song and prayer. In letting others take on the responsibility for prayer on your behalf, you are left with greater freedom to be open to the presence and grace of God.

Standing, Sitting and Kneeling

Throughout the booklet, you will find various references to posture:

- **Standing** is used for parts of the service where the emphasis is on praising or praying to God together; so we usually stand to sing hymns, and for certain important prayers.
- **Sitting** indicates listening and receiving; so we sit for the first and second readings from the Bible, and for the sermon.
- **Kneeling** is the traditional position for personal prayer. Please speak to one of the Vergers or Sidesmen if you would like a cushion for kneeling.

Adopting the same posture is a way of showing that we are worshipping God together, as his people. However, please always feel free to adopt a different posture, especially if standing or kneeling is uncomfortable

Acknowledgements

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We are delighted to welcome to you to Southwell Minster. It is a joy and an honour to host this celebration of the ministry and witness of women as priests in the Church of England. For centuries, women have offered themselves to the mission of God in many and varied ways. We celebrate this 30th anniversary as a marker in the journey that so many have been on, as a way of recognising those who were called before 1994 and sadly were unable to be ordained as priest; and to pray for the continuing ministry of the whole people of God, in particular the many women who continue to respond to God's call upon their hearts and lives to be priests.

A Timeline of Ordained Women's Ministry in the Church of England

- 1862 First deaconesses serving in ministry (This was a lay order)
- 1920 Call for women's ordination brought to the Lambeth Conference
- 1944 First woman priest in the Anglican Communion, Hong Kong born Florence Li Tim-Oi, is ordained in Shoaqing, Guandung, China as a wartime emergency measure.
- 1969 First women Lay Readers licensed (there had been some in WW1, but they were allowed to lapse)
- 1975 General Synod determines 'There are no theological fundamental objections to the ordination of women to the priesthood'
- 1978: MOW (Movement for the Ordination of Women) begins.
- 1985 General Synod votes for women deacons
- 1987 First women ordained deacon
- 1992 General Synod votes in favour of women priests
- 1994 First women ordained priest in Diocese of Southwell during May 1994
- 2005 General Synod begins a process for the consecration of women bishops
- 2012 General Synod legislation fails
- 2014 20th anniversary 'celebrations' of women priests
- 2014 The Revd Sarah Clark becomes the first female Archdeacon for the Diocese of Southwell and Nottingham and subsequently the Bishop of Jarrow in 2019.
- 2014 General Synod votes in favour of Women Bishops
- 2015 First woman bishop: the Rt Revd Libby Lane as the Suffragan Bishop of Stockport
- 2018 Dame Sarah Mullally becomes the 133rd Bishop of London and the first female bishop to take part in the coronation of a monarch in 2023.
