About the Advent Procession

For many centuries, Christians have observed the Sundays before Christmas as a time of expectation and preparation for the great festival of the Nativity, when we celebrate God becoming flesh and blood, being born as one of us. Advent is a time of joyful waiting: we know that Jesus is coming to us, so we can almost begin to celebrate even as we prepare. But Advent simultaneously focuses our attention on another event, still in the future — the final Advent of Christ as judge at the end of time. The Old Testament prophets looked forward to both of these happenings, almost as though they were the same thing. In our Advent Procession, through words and music, we enter more deeply into the mystery of Advent, learning to live in God's time as we wait joyfully for Jesus both as the baby of Bethlehem, and as the Son of God who will one day return and take us to himself.

This service is structured around the **Advent Antiphons**, which were already in use by the eighth century, and subsequently became one of the key musical features of the days leading up to Christmas. Each of the first seven antiphons is based upon an attribute of Christ mentioned in scripture:

17 December: O Sapientia (O Wisdom)

18 December: O Adonai

19 December: O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse)

20 December: O Clavis David (O Key of David)

21 December: O Oriens (O Dawn of the East)

22 December: O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations)

Isaiah 11: 1,10; 52:15

Isaiah 22:22

An English medieval practice was to add an eighth antiphon – O Virgo virginum

(O virgin of virgins).

The first seven antiphons are best known today in an amalgamated form as the Advent hymn 'O Come, O Come, Emmanuel', which we sing towards the end of this. service.

See, the day is coming, burning like an oven, when all the arrogant and all evildoers will be stubble; the day that comes shall burn them up, says the Lord of hosts, so that it will leave them neither root nor branch. But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings. You shall go out leaping like calves from the stall. And you shall tread down the wicked, for they will be ashes under the soles of your feet, on the day when I act, says the Lord of hosts.

Lo, I will send you the prophet Elijah before the great and terrible day of the Lord comes. He will turn the hearts of parents to their children and the hearts of children to their parents, so that I will not come and strike the land with a curse.

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. So then, let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.



Isaiah 11: 1–5

A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.

The spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord. His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord.

He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to bring good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives
and recovery of sight to the blind,
to let the oppressed go free,
to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.'

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.'




