

Top 10 Things to See

1 The Angel Window

Delight in the Angel Window which features over 300 angels. This vibrant window captivates with its heavenly beauty.

2 Christus Rex

Gaze at the stunning 10-foot figure soaring above the Nave. Crafted from elm and oak with copper and gold leaf.

3 Tympanum

This ancient carved lintel is thought to be the oldest stone in the Minster.

4 The Chapter House – The Leaves of Southwell

Visit the famous Leaves of Southwell and marvel at the intricate carvings of Green Men, plants and animals – a feast for the eyes.

The Bishop's Seat

We are both a Cathedral and a Minster.

Discover what makes us both at the Bishop's Seat.

6 Candle Chapel

Light a candle and take a peaceful moment for reflection or prayer in this serene space.

Great War Memorial Window

With powerful imagery the window offers a lasting tribute to those who sacrificed their lives.

8 Bread Pews

Discover the Minster's Anglo-Saxon and Roman roots in these historic pews.

9 The Archbishop's Palace and State Chamber

Walk in the footsteps of Cardinal Wolsey, who stayed here during his fall from power, and King Charles I, who spent his last days of freedom at this historic site.

10 The Palace Gardens

Relax in vibrant gardens amidst the ruins of the Archbishop's Palace, with sculptures linking to the Leaves of Southwell.
